Report from the President of the Board

On reflection 2023-2024 has been a year of exciting changes and new challenges. Throughout the past year the board of directors has been pleased to provide oversight and support to help our teams navigate these changes and challenges, with the goal of providing housing, programs and support to some of our most vulnerable families.

One highlight from the past year was welcoming women and children into, Penny's Place, our long-term housing program. This program provided 14 new residences for women in our community leaving domestic abuse and violence. Penny's Place was named after Penny Douglass in recognition for her 23 years of service to Elizabeth Fry as a long-time board member and volunteer. Penny continues to volunteer with us and she is an integral part of our organization.

Another highlight for the organization was The Gender Equity Program, conference at Thompson Rivers University, which was attended by community partners, donors, students, and academia. The board would like to thank Nicole Green, for all of her hard work and commitment to this project and for holding space for our community to have these very important discussion.

In February 2024, the board was very pleased to announce that Allison McLauchlan would be taking on the role of Executive Director. Allison comes to Elizabeth Fry from Kelowna and brings with her a wealth of experience in the social services sector, particularly with respect to women-focussed programs. Allison has been working in the violence against women and children sector for over 20 years and we are thrilled to have her aboard as we look forward to an exciting phase of new growth and change in our organization. The board of directors would also like to thank Holly-Rose Vesper who stepped in when needed and filled the role of interim executive director. Holly-Rose continues to show her passion and commitment to the work that we do, and we are thankful to have her continue to be a part of the leadership team.

The Board feel very honored to be part of this organization and thankful for our staff, leadership team, volunteers and for those, who provide financial support to our programs. It is due to your donations and fund-raising events that Kamloops Elizabeth Fry Society is able provide services and programs to vulnerable families within our community. I am sure that this coming year will be filled with successes and challenges, but I am confident that together we can face whatever comes our way. | Family Stepping Stones

Throughout the last year the Family Stepping Stones was able to support 14 unique women and their 18 children, creating an overall impact on 32 individuals. We supported two family transitions into our new Women's Long Term Housing units (Penny's Place), one family unit into our community housing building, and one family out of community to attend post secondary school. Throughout the year folks in program had access to many supports, including volunteer hair services, volunteer counselling service, cultural connections and smudging, gardening and cooking experiences with their children and volunteers, food share and psycho-educational supports and connection to community.

"Since arriving at Family Stepping Stones, secure, safe housing with staff support, and Food share options, I am finally able to provide my son the nutritious meals he should have."

Housing Resources Service and Women's Housing Support Services programs continue to be a part of a network of services assisting people in locating and maintaining their housing. A lack of safe, affordable housing continues to be one of the most urgent issues facing the Kamloops community. These two services helped clients through access to information, referral assistance, locating housing, providing life skills training and other individualized supports to help folks maintain their housing. Throughout the 2023-2024 year these programs supported 1,324 people either obtain or maintain their housing in Kamloops.

A client came through the Women's Housing Support Program having just lost her housing. Unfortunately, she was also suffering a medical disorder and not given much time to live. Through the coordination of the Housing Support Worker and the other Housing staff, Elizabeth Fry was able to connect her with a unit where she could live out the rest of her time in peace.

Elizabeth Fry Legal Clinic

Throughout the 2023-2024 operating year the Efry Legal Clinic continued to serve the communities of Kamloops and Kelowna. As of February 2024 Kamloops Elizabeth Fry is no longer the operator of the legal clinic. The clinic does however operate under a new Society called The Okanagan Thompson Legal Clinic, here in town and in Kelowna.

Projects

The Gender Equity Program, funded by the Women and Gender Equity Funds from the Government of Canada closed the project this year with a conference at Thompson Rivers University, during the conference they delivered research results, spoke about gender and equality and engaged in panel discussion. Some of the presenters during this conference included: Nicole Green the Project Lead, Thompson River's University research and faculty members; Dr. Jennifer Murphy; Dr. Julianna West; Dr. Amie Mclean; Dr. Laura Lamb; Parliamentary Secretary for gender equity – Kelli Paddon and a a representative from the BC Office of the Human Rights Commissioner.

Housing

One of the largest impacts to share from this year, is the opening of Penny's Place, named in honour of a previous KDEFS Board President and long-standing volunteer to Kamloops Efry, Penny Douglas. This is the Women's Long Term Housing townhouse units which opened in the Summer of 2023, providing 14 new units of affordable housing specific to women. The Housing Program now provides 111 units of housing in Kamloops and housed 130 families in 2023-2024 year and aims to continue to reduce barriers for vulnerable folks to gain accessing to housing.

"When Penny's Place opened in July 2023. One woman who moved in had just finished her degree in mental health and addictions, the final key to her securing work and having safety was moving to Penny's Place. She refers to her life now as "Blessed".



Rent Bank

The Kamloops and District Elizabeth Fry Society operates two Rent Banks the Elizabeth Fry – Servicing the Thompson Nicola Regional District and Kamloops City Specifically, as well as the Province Wide Rent Bank which provides services to all communities without a local rent bank access, to ensure the mandate of BC Rent Bank reaches 100% of the province. Between both Rent Banks Kamloops Efry, provided 109 of Loans and Grants In 2023-2024, for a total of \$217,826.95, which directly aims to keep folks from facing homelessness housed and prevent future risk of homelessness.




