Housing

Throughout the 2024–2025 fiscal year, the Kamloops and District Elizabeth Fry Society's housing programs provided support to over 130 families across 110 units in four housing complexes operated by the Society. The Maintenance Team responded to 198 service requests and completed several major capital projects aimed at improving safety, accessibility, and sustainability. These included the modernization of the elevator at Hilltop Apartments, the installation of enhanced security surveillance systems at Cornerhouse, Hilltop, and Elizabeth Court to increase tenant safety and reduce criminal activity, and upgraded lighting in the parkades at Hilltop and Elizabeth Court, which improved visibility and reinforced the Society's commitment to environmental sustainability.

During the 2024–2025 program year, KDEFS received 94 direct housing applications, while an additional 133 applicants on the BC Housing waitlist identified Hilltop and Elizabeth Court Apartments as their preferred providers—bringing the total number of interested applicants to 227. In contrast, only 18 units became available throughout the year due to tenant move-outs. This significant gap between demand and availability underscores the ongoing shortage of affordable housing in Kamloops and the urgent need to expand access for individuals and families seeking stable, secure housing.

| Family Stepping Stones

The Family Stepping Stones program was highly active throughout the 2024–2025 fiscal year, providing direct support to 26 clients—15 women and 11 children—and assisting an additional 14 families residing in KDEFS Women's Housing at Penny's Place. The Women's Second Stage Housing Support Workers delivered 624 in-person service contacts, facilitated 312 resource connections and referrals, and provided essential items such as FoodShare, diapers, clothing, and move-in kits during 88 separate interactions. In addition to individualized support, the program offered a variety of psychoeducational, social, and cultural opportunities for women and families to engage and build community. Notable activities included a Social Sobriety BBQ, a Stopping the Violence presentation facilitated by the YMCA, Boundaries and Safety Talks, nutrition learning groups for children and adults, weekly FoodShare, Story Time sessions for children, gardening groups, Smudge Spray Kit crafts, and holiday events such as family photos with a volunteer Santa and seasonal crafts for children.

Each year, the Family Stepping Stones program partners with local businesses and community groups to sponsor families during the holiday season, providing women and their children with gifts and treats they might not otherwise receive. This initiative brings joy and comfort to families facing financial hardship and helps foster a sense of community and care. For their generous support in sponsoring families this year, we extend heartfelt thanks to Kamloops Airport, SA Electric, Progressive Planet, Penny Douglas's Parenting Support Group, and Berneice Machuk.

HOUSING SUPPORTS

Throughout the 2024–2025 year, housing support staff worked closely with the housing team to assist individuals in obtaining and maintaining stable housing, including sorting and managing applications. A key initiative during the year was the reorganization and relocation of the staple community resource, Lizzy's Closet, which has moved from 827 Seymour Street to its new location at 130 St. Paul Street in Kamloops. Lizzy's Closet is now open to the public on Mondays and Thursdays from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., continuing to provide essential items to those in need.





Sky Youth Program

The SKY Program is a full-time attendance initiative designed for adjudicated youth, with referrals received exclusively through MCFD Youth Probation. As a non-public program, SKY maintains a focused and structured intake process. During the 2024–2025 year, the program received 11 inquiries, processed 7 referrals, screened 7 clients, and accepted 4 new youth, ultimately serving a total of 6 youth throughout the year. Participants engaged in a range of psychoeducational learning opportunities, recreational activities, community involvement, and volunteerism, all aimed at fostering personal growth, encouraging community contribution, and building essential life skills.

Rent Bank Program

The Kamloops and District Elizbeth Fry Society, operates two rent banks the Kamloops Elizabeth Fry Rentbank and the Province Wide Rentbank.

The Kamloops Elizabeth Fry Society received 329 applications for assistance, provided 166 referrals to alternate resources, provided 37 loans impacting 132 people. The Kamloops Elizabeth Fry Rent Bank provided \$74,554.60 direct loan assistance to clients, and \$7,589.00 grants. The Repayment rate for these loans was 66% which is an increase from last year and works towards the ongoing sustainability of this essential financial homelessness prevention program.

The Province Wide Rentbank, received 686 Pre-Assessments, providing 485 resource referral, 49 loans impacting 159 people. The Kamloops Elizabeth Fry Rent Bank provided \$113,970.94 direct loan assistance to clients, and \$58,000.00 grants. The repayment rate for these loans was 60%.

The Rent Bank program also facilitated Financial Literacy workshops for 14 women, empowering them with tools to thrive after experiencing or fleeing gender-based violence. This initiative reflects a growing focus on prevention and education as key strategies for the future of the Rent Bank. By equipping individuals with financial knowledge and resources, the program aims to reduce the risk of eviction and homelessness—critical concerns in Kamloops, where housing precarity driven by affordability and limited availability remains a significant challenge.






